The catalyst for the creation of Surrey Gardens Trust (SGT) was the arrival of Mike Dawson at Surrey County Council in 1989 as Assistant County Planning Officer. He and Lorna McRobie had previously started Avon's Garden Trust.

With the enthusiastic support of Lady Heald CBE, who had been Hon. County Organiser for the National Gardens Scheme (NGS) for more than thirty years, an inaugural meeting of interested people was held in March 1990 at her home, Chilworth Manor, and a Steering Committee was formed.





A committee of enthusiastic Surrey dwellers is planning to stimulate owners of historic gardens and parks. To-gether with members and officers of the County Council, they will look at properties in greater depth in order to safeguard their future. All this follows the lead of Hampshire and other counties. We shall be the 14th County Gardens Trust.

The Trust will need further administrative support and it welcomes members. By becoming a member you will be supporting a charity which could greatly benefit the people, gardens and parks of Surrey. The steering committee will encourage anyone who feels able to devote time and energy to help us through these early days.

I must thank members of the steering committee for their efforts to make all this happen. They have laid the ground for an exciting new era.

Surrey is rich in historic parks and gardens. Many, however, have considerable problems, -ageing trees, lack of woodland management, scrub invasion, silting lakes or water courses and decaying garden buildings. Which are the significant original layouts? What is their background? Where is practical work needed? They must be surveyed whilst evidence survives, then conserved and maintained.

We would like to promote interest among landowners in the potential of their sites. It is hoped that they will see the Trust as an organisation with expertise to assist them in restoration and management. Already we are promoting conservation projects in specific parks and gardens and are able to assist with grant aid and professional advice.

We want to involve young people, helping them to appreciate gardens and encouraging gardening projects in school and college grounds.

The Trust will also foster widespread interest in parks and gardens through the media, by mounting exhibitions, holding open days and other events of interest.



Painshill Park, Cobham - Mavis Collier

By 1740, relying on borrowed finance, the Hon Charles Hamilton (1704 - 86), artist, gardener and farmer, acquired the land and laid out Painshill Park. Eighteenth century visitors experienced changing scenes, invoking a variety of moods. Funds were augmented by viticulture, brick-making and selling trees.

Today Painshill Park, a Registered Charity, is employing many skills to restore Hamilton's work. Tree surveys, extensive archaeological and documentary research preceded restoration; horticulture and arboriculture have been essential to the scheme.

Visitors can see 18th century Painshill in embryo. Vineyard reinstatement, grotto restoration and replanting continue, and our large team of volunteers is happy to welcome newcomers.



NEWSLETTERS have been produced twice-yearly to publish research articles and events. Since 2015 they have been published electronically.


In 2020 SDS & IA Group, a digital archive management company, scanned and indexed all the SGT Newsletters (free of charge) and these are now available to browse on the website.

RESEARCH and RECORDING

From the start one of the primary aims of the Trust has been to identify and research historic gardens within the county with a view to adding them to either national or local lists. This work is undertaken by the Research and Recording Group whose members received training, either from other


researchers or on organised courses.





1993 RESTORATION OF THE PHILLIPS MEMORIAL CLOISTER AT GODALMING

The cloister was designed by local architect, Hugh Thackeray Turner, to commemorate the radio officer on the *Titanic*, Jack Phillips, who lived in Godalming, and the planting was designed by Gertrude Jekyll.



1996 LEAFLET FOR NONSUCH MANSION

A WALK ROUND THE GARDENS OF NONSUCH MANSION


When you step through the gate at Nonsuch you not only enter a beautiful garden but one which was famous in both the 18th and 19th centuries. By following the route shown inside this leaflet and the notes which start below, you can trace the past glories of Nonsuch while enjoying the pleasures of the present garden.

1 The black and white sections of the garden wall and the blocked up door

These date from the 16th century. The 18th and 19th century houses may have been built on the site of a Keeper's Lodge described in the Parliamentary Survey of 1650 as "a pretty distance remote" from Henry VIII's great Palace of Nonsuch. The Palace site itself, which was completely excavated in 1959-60, can be found to the south of the Ewell gate of the park, indicated by two stone markers.

2 The wisteria on the garden side of the

wall Swete's Handbook of Epsom (1860) describes a 120 feet (36.5 metres) long wisteria, probably planted here in the 1840's when William Francis Farmer owned the Mansion (you can see his initials nearby above a small first floor window). The present splendid wisteria may be a descendant of the first. The shrub bed in the lawn opposite is shown in the Ordnance Survey map of 1913.



1996 SCHOOLS' AWARD LAUNCHED

One of the Surrey Gardens Trust's principal aims is to encourage the county's schools to develop horticultural and environmental projects in their grounds in which children can become involved.

Since its inception the Trust has awarded some £33,000 under this scheme.

Applications are welcome from any Surrey maintained nursery, infant or primary school and academy planning to create, or develop further, a garden that will facilitate children's learning through talk, play and environmental awareness.




GERTRUDE JEKYLL REEF POINT DRAWINGS COLLECTION

In 1997 Michael Edwards initiated a project to produce hard copies of 2,500 drawings from the microfilms held by Godalming Museum of the Reef Point Collection of Gertrude Jekyll drawings held at the University of Berkeley in California. These were collated, checked and re-indexed by members of SGT and bound copies presented to Godalming Museum on 4 December 1999.

In 2009 copies of most of the letters in the collection were copied and indexed.




2001 PUBLICATION OF IN PURSUIT OF THE PICTURESQUE





the two. The area... is first flooded with the light of the sky by means of water reflection, and carved out of this light are abstract island shapes reminiscent of earth forms as seen from the air...

*The garden was designed at the time when the first Sputnik spun miraculously round and far above the earth, and it was probably the implication of this that caused the whirl of circles that is



reminiscent of the planets. Throughout there is a constant play upon illusion, whether it is that the stepping-stones apparently float like lotuses upon the surface of the water or whether it is that the water scenery does really join with the sky where it passes out of the scene to the west."

All the magical and fantastic elements of the fifties are contained in the garden which is a remarkable survival of the period.

The refurbishment has been carried out 'in the spirit of Jellicoe' by House of Fraser in conjunction with Draffin Associates Landscape Consultants and Gerry Lytle Architects.

English Heritage has listed the garden as a Grade II site on its Register of Parks and Cardens of Special Historic Interest in England.

This information panel has been designed by Surrey Gardens Trust in association with Guildford Borough Council



In 2000 the Jellicoe Roof Garden at the House of Fraser store in Guildford was listed on the EH *Register* and refurbished in 2001

To publicise *In Pursuit of the Picturesque* a light entertainment was devised using the poem by William Combe. Gilpin was so well known that he could be identified as the impecunious schoolmaster/curate, Dr Syntax, who sets off on his horse Grizzle 'to make a Tour and work it up' in the poem published in 1809, 'Tours of Dr Syntax in Search of the Picturesque' by Combe with illustrations by Thomas Rowlandson.



Performances were given at Juniper Hall, Gatton Park and Painshill Park.

John Bridel was Dr Syntax and Beryl Saich played his wife Dolly and numerous other characters, which were indicated by a change of hat.

THE GARDENS OF WOTTON HOUSE


otton House, listed Grade II*, lies in the valley of the Tillingbourne, three miles west of Dorking. It dates from the late 16th century but has been extensively modified and extended. Since 1579 it has been owned by the Evelyn family. In 1640 George Evelyn created an Italianate garden around the house to the designs of his brother, John Evelyn, the eminent garden designer, writer and diarist.

The enclosed formal gardens survived intact until at least the mid 18th century. Subsequent generations of the family carried out modifications which removed some of the formal elements and overlaid a new design layout. Despite this, key features of the original gardens were retained and have survived, including a terraced mount and classical garden temple. The gardens which survive today are largely the work of William Evelyn during the latter part of the 19th century.

During and since WWII, the property has been in institutional use – billeted in wartime and then leased in turn to the Home Office, Fire Service College and BT. In 2001, it was leased to the Hayley Conference Centres; the house has been refurbished and the site developed as a conference centre. The grounds have been extensively restored to a management plan by Colson Stone which was implemented by Waterers Landscapes.

2005 PUBLICATION OF BROOME PARK, BETCHWORTH by DON JOSEY

Christopher Kilby, born in Boston, America in 1705, retired from his mercantile interests to Betchworth in 1763, where he laid out the grounds of Tranquil Dale (later called Broome Park) in the fashionable landscape style.

A Brief Guide to

THE GROUNDS OF ALBURY PARK

Albury Park, grade I on the English Heritage Register of Parks and Gardens, lies to the south of the A25, some 4.5 miles south-east of Guildford, in the valley of the Tillingbourne.

In 1637/8 the manor of Albury passed to the Trustees for Thomas Howard, 2nd Earl of Arundel. After his death in 1646, the succession passed to his eldest grandson, Thomas, who in 1653 conveyed Albury to his brother, Henry, later to become 6th Duke of Norfolk. John Evelyn (1620-1706), diarist and author of Sylva, had much admired the property during an earlier visit and tried to buy the estate in 1652 to be near to his brother at Wotton. However, he did not succeed and settled at Sayes Court, Deptford.

With the architect George Evelyn, Henry enlarged the manor house. He also made major alterations to the gardens with the assistance of John Evelyn.


Subsequently, after passing through a number of ownerships, the estate was acquired by Henry Drummond in 1819. He employed A W N Pugin (1812-52) to remodel the house and planted exotic trees within the pleasure grounds. Through the marriage of Drummond's daughter, the property passed to the Percy family, the Dukes of Northumberland.

The mansion and its immediate garden was sold in 1969 and is still in use as residential apartments. The pleasure grounds, with their

Evelyn terraces, alcoves, tunnel, pool and bath house remain in the ownership of the Trustees of the Albury Estate.



2008 GARDEN AT GUILDFORD CATHEDRAL


The 'Seeds of Hope' Children's Garden at Guildford Cathedral, was created for the benefit of bereaved children and designed by SGT member, Sue White.

SGT was a partner in the European Garden Heritage Network with gardens in England (Painshill), Germany and France.

Funding and Surrey County Council negotiations led to the Bus Route 515 from Esher station, stopping at Claremont, Painshill and Wisley.

2009 GATEWAY GARDEN VISITS SCHEME INITIATED

This scheme was set up to allow people who would not normally be able to visit historic gardens to do so. Since then Mary Caroe and more recently Alex White have organised numerous visits for residents of the Meath Home, Godalming, St Dominic's School, Hambledon, Hydon Hill Cheshire Home and others to the gardens, including Ramster at Chiddingfold, Vann at Hambledon, Loseley Park at Guildford and Westbrook at Godalming.

GRANTS

SGT has given many thousands of pounds in grants to garden and landscape projects in Surrey, especially to our most prestigious landscapes at Gatton and Painshill.

In the early days of the Trust, grants were received from Surrey County Council and several district and borough councils. In recent years, however, these grants have almost disappeared and, in order to give grants, the Trust has had to raise money by obtaining income from lectures and garden visits and hosting fundraising events.

Portrait of a SGT Council member Mary Caroe, doctor, gardener and supreme networker

Most members will have met Mary at one of our events and know that she has a very famous garden at Vann near Godalming and organises the Gateway visits for the Surrey Gardens Trust.

I interviewed Mary to find out more about her. I was especially interested to find out about her career as a doctor and how she managed to bring up her large family, pursue a career in medicine and look after the house and garden at Vann.

Mary graduated in medicine in 1963 from the Westminster Hospital Medical School having been one of four women in her class of 40 students. Just before she graduated she married Martin but they had to spend a year apart while she finished her hospital training in London.



She had her sights set on a career in General Practice and was employed as a locum GP until she was appointed the family doctor to the Scots and lish Guards based at Pithright. Surprisingly, compared to female doctors today, it was very difficult for Mary to get a job as a GP partner as there was still a certain amount of prejudice against female doctors.

I suspect that Mary was undaunted by any prejudice because she went on to have five children and still have some really interesting jobs including running a women's and young people's advisory service in Guildford for 27 years and being one of five police surgeons for the Surrey Constabulary. She was the only doctor ever to be awarded the Chief Constable's Commendation. Whilst working in Guildford she look a Pitman's course as she became aware of the need to be computer literate.

EVENTS

A large part of the Trust's work is to inform and educate through a series of lectures held during the winter months and visits to gardens of interest during the summer.

It also holds Study Days concentrating in depth on specific places or people and more recent ones have been:

17 July 2015 **GERTRUDE JEKYLL**, with speakers Brenda Lewis & Marion Woodward and visits to Munstead Wood, guided by head gardener, Annabel Watts, and to The Quadrangle, formerly Miss Jekyll's stables and nursery area, led by the current owner, Gail Naughton.

August 2015 **PAINSHILL PARK**, with speaker Cherrill Sands and a tour of the park led by Jan Clarke.

19 April 2017 **JOHN EVELYN**, held at Wotton with speaker Beryl Saich, followed by guided tours of Wotton and Albury.

Since 2017 the Events Committee has been led by Sheri Sticpewich who succeeded Wendy Craft in this role.

MERGER OF AGT WITH GHS

- To encourage the creation of new parks, gardens and designed landscapes.

One of the most important roles carried out by individual trusts, on behalf of The Gardens Trust, is to comment on planning matters.

SGT is consulted on planning applications which affect not only parks and gardens on the Historic England *Register*, but also sites identified as being of local interest.

This task has been undertaken for the past 15 years by Don Josey, who has looked at approximately 40 proposals a year, including individual applications and phases of Local Plan preparation within each Surrey district.

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

2016 saw the 300th anniversary of the birth of Lancelot 'Capability' Brown with celebrations throughout the country. SGT held a Study Day at Gatton on 12 July 2016. The speakers were Steffi Shields, Louise Miller and Brenda Lewis.

Brown worked for the owner of Gatton Park, Sir George Colebrooke, between 1762 and 1767, remodelling the landscape and creating the 25 acre lake.



Gatton also held a 'Picnic in the Park' event attended by various 18th-century characters, Brenda Lewis amongst them.

There are five other sites associated with Brown in Surrey – Clandon Park, Claremont, Laleham, Peper Harow and Upper Gatton.

HERITAGE OPEN DAYS IN MOLE VALLEY



On several occasions SGT has put on talks and displays at the Letherhead Institute as part of the Heritage Open weekends organised by Mole Valley District Council during September each year.

In 2016 the theme was 'Lives and Landscapes' and SGT members Brenda Lewis and Marion Woodward chose the topic 'Prospects of Mole Valley: important landscapes and the writers who described them' using material from our publication *In Pursuit of the Picturesque*. Brenda spoke on Saturday morning and the display was available to view throughout the weekend.

In 2018 the theme was 'Extraordinary Women'. At this event Michael Edwards gave a talk entitled 'Gertrude Jekyll: a Gardener and so much more' and Marion Woodward provided a display entitled 'Gertrude Jekyll: Beyond the Boots'. Both of these highlighted the many talents of one of Surrey's most celebrated residents, not only as garden designer, but also as an artist, craftswoman and writer on horticulture, home life and Surrey traditions.

JEKYLL DIGITISATION PROJECT

For some years it was the ambition of Michael Edwards to achieve the digitisation of Gertrude Jekyll's drawings archive in California, thus making them available to view on the internet. In 2016 he approached the Environmental Design Archives, University of California, Berkeley (the EDA), to obtain an estimate of the cost of such a project. Over time it became obvious that to raise the entire sum at one time would be prohibitive so it was decided initially to raise the \$23,000 needed to scan and process just the Surrey sites.

Donations (large and small) were received and various fund-raising activities (see Solars event below and HOD talk above – and there were others, including a talk by Richard Bisgrove) took place and by summer 2018 we were in a position to agree a contract with the EDA to pay for the work to be carried out.

By the time it was complete, our new website was also available to host the link to the images and they went live in spring 2019. Thankfully, this was just before the untimely death of Michael Edwards to whom we (and all Jekyll enthusiasts) owe an immense debt of gratitude for his enthusiasm and tenacity in achieving this valuable contribution to Jekyll research.

NEW WEBSITE

Our original website had served us well since 2004 but did not work well across the multiple platforms (PC, laptop, iPad and smartphone) introduced since its inception.

In 2016 Atticus & Byrne was appointed to create a new website. Much discussion took place to create a brief and eventually Sarah Dickinson and Sheri Sticpewich took over the implementation of the project which went live in March 2018.

At the same time, our logo was updated.





2018 BICENTENARY OF HUMPHRY REPTON'S DEATH



Humphry Repton (1752-1818) produced 'Red Books' for estates around the country, including two in Surrey and SGT celebrated at both these venues.

On 18 April we had 'Breakfast and Bluebells' at **HATCHLANDS PARK** and an early morning walk round the park. We worked with the National Trust to design a Repton Walk guide and also produced a facsimile copy of Repton's Red Book for the Park, the original of which is part of the Morgan Library, New York collection. A bound copy was donated to Hatchlands and further copies are available for sale.

2019 GEORGE LONDON AT FETCHAM PARK

George London (*circa* 1650-1714) was one of the most influential nurserymen and garden designers during the late 17th and 18th centuries.

Speakers for this Study Day on 11 May were garden historian Dr Sally Jeffery, local historian Vivien White and Neil Cook, Head Gardener at Hanbury Hall.

The day focused on George London's mastery of garden design, his originality and versatility spanning over three decades, including his work at Fetcham Park, believed to be his last completed garden, and Hanbury Hall in Worcestershire.
